




For the first time, personal pensions income (£2 per week on average) has been separated out from investment income.




Since 2000/1, the income (relative to NAE) of single pensioners has gone down by 1 percentage point, and that of couples up by 2 percentage points.

The proportion of pensioners in each fifth of the overall population net income distribution, 1979 and 2001/2 (BHC)




Note: Figures for 1979 are based on the Family Expenditure Survey, and are only broadly comparable to later estimates based on the Family Resources Survey




# Private pension income makes the difference between rich and poor pensioners




The gap reduced from 66% in 2000/1 to 61% in 2001/2.




Using median figures also shows that the gap between the richest and poorest pensioners has increased, albeit a smaller gap than the mean average figures illustrate. The gap increased from 36% in 1987 to 47% in 2001/2.




The percentage of pensioner households in poverty (on this particular relative measure) has fallen from 24% in 2000/1 to 22% in 2001/2.

# Older pensioners are more likely to be poor Median gross pensioner incomes (excluding means-tested)


Median gross pensioner incomes (excluding means-tested benefits) by age, £ per week, 2001/2




There is a slightly steeper gradient for single pensioners from age 65-69 to age 80+ than in 2000/1




